Spanish Fork City will hold a public hearing on **June 7**, at 6:30 pm at the Spanish Fork City Office, 40 south Main Street, Spanish Fork, Utah. The purpose of the public hearing is to review the Tentative Fiscal Year 2006 Budget. The budget includes transfer of funds which cannot be defined as reasonable allocation of costs between funds. These transfers include funds from the Electric Fund to the Golf Fund, Storm Drain Fund, and General Fund. These transfers also include funds from the Solid Waste Fund to the Swimming Pool Fund.

Electricity and Your Safety

As the weather improves and our winter hibernation ends, those jobs around the outside of the home have piled up and need attention. Before you start that work, take a moment to remember a few simple safety tips and then identify the possible hazards around your home.

Call Before You Dig

Digging into underground power lines can be as dangerous as contacting an overhead power line. Before you dig to plant a tree, install a sprinkler system or build a fence, please call your local utility notification center, commonly known as Blue Stakes to have all your underground utilities marked for free. Simply call 1-800-662-4111 two working days before you

dig and all the utilities in your area will be marked.

Look Up!

Whenever you're working outdoors, please be aware of overhead power lines and keep tools and other objects away from them. Electricity can be deadly if your tree clippers, ladder or other tools come into contact with a power line.

Before pruning tree branches always check for power lines, if a branch is close to a line, call 798-5030 ext. 10 or 25.

Stay Away and Stay Safe

Don't go anywhere near a downed



power line or anything it may be touching. If you see a downed line, call the Electric Department immediately. Do not get out of your car and keep others, including pets, away. Also, if you fly a kite or play with outdoor toys that have the potential to reach a power line, stay away. The risk is too great. Choose another area in which to play. By following the simple safety tips, we hope all enjoy a safe summer.

Did You Know...?

Spanish Fork Community Water Park

The water park holds 430,000 gallons and it takes 2 days to fill it if it is empty. Depending on the water's condition (and recent droughts), the pool may not be drained at the end of each year.

Average daily attendance over the entire season is 750 people. On a warm, summer day, attendance exceeds 1,100 people, while on a cool, cloudy day, fewer than 500 will visit the park.

The water temperature is maintained between 84 and 86 degrees.

The pH of the pool is constantly monitored by computer and also hand-checked each hour. To maintain proper pH level, the computer system will inject 12,000 gallons of chlorine throughout the swimming season.

There are 30 two-week swim classes and 9 diving classes that are taught throughout the summer. Water aerobics classes are taught 3 times a week in the morning and in the evening. On average, 15 people attend the morning aerobics class and 35 attend the evening aerobics class.



Indoor Electrical Tips

Spanish Fork Power does everything possible to provide the best power to your home and business. As we strive to do our best, we have a few tips that will help you limit inconveniences in your home.

Outlet and Cords



One common hazard that we create in our home is called the "Electrical Octopus". This happens anytime you overload an outlet as shown to the left. If you have one of these in your home, get rid of it right away. Also never put an extension cord under a rug or the carpet; the rubbing from the carpet on the cord may cause exposure and fire hazard.

Surge Protectors

To protect your electronic devices from power surges, you can purchase a relatively inexpensive surge protector for multiple devices. These surge protectors are

recommended for any high profile electrical device.

Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS)

A step up from the surge protector is an Uninterruptible Power Source. The UPS can actually be used to run your computer or electrical equipment for quite some time after the power has shut off. The cheapest UPS would give at least 5 to 10 minutes of extended life without power, giving you ample time to properly shut down your equipment.



The SFCN headend and all the nodes for the SFCN system throughout town have UPS backup. If we were to lose power, that system would continue to run for a number of hours. If your computer and modem were connected to a UPS, you would still be able to have Internet during a power outage.
