Winter Driving Rules

Once again, winter is upon us. This means snow shoveling, slippery roads, snow plows and salting. We here at the Spanish Fork City Public Works Department would like to take this opportunity to ask for your cooperation with a few simple winter rules that apply to this time of year.

- Whenever possible, please do not park vehicles, boats, trailers or any other items on the street. This makes it very difficult to navigate large snow plows and salters around your area, and provide a timely removal of snow and ice.
- Please do not shovel or blow snow from sidewalks and driveways into the roadway. This causes a packed and slippery area in the road that the plows may or may not be able to remove. If it is done before the road has been plowed, it will probably end up back in your drive approach anyway. Why not place it on the lawns or plants where, when it melts, it can do some good. If you have no choice but to pile snow on the curb at the end of your driveway, place the pile on the traffic "down stream" side of the drive. This will ensure that when the plows come down the street, they will not push the large pile back into your drive way.
- Please be patient with the plow drivers. They have a large area from which to remove snow. Roads are plowed in a particular prioritized order. Main roads such as Center Street, Spanish Oak's, North Main St. are all plowed first, followed by secondary streets, these are roads that usually run through subdivisions and con-

nect with main roads. Subdivision streets are plowed next, then circles, and finally dead-ends. Traditionally it takes our crews 14-24 hours to completely remove snow from all Spanish Fork City Streets. This time frame greatly depends on the severity of the storm. On rare occasions some subdivision streets and circles are not plowed until the following day.

- We strongly suggest that you do not allow children to play on or tunnel into piles of snow that are placed on the roadways. There can be disastrous results when plows come back for future storms or when "widening out" snow left on streets.
- When following plow trucks, please keep an extra large distance between you and the truck. These vehicles have to make many adjustments to the road surfaces and contours, and often have to unexpectedly back-up. When two or more trucks are plowing in "tandem" on larger roads, please do not attempt to pass these vehicles. You can and probably will get stuck or lose control of your vehicle in the deep windrow of snow produced by this action.
- Spanish Fork City Plow operators try to be as careful as possible not to throw snow onto sidewalks and driveways, but accidents do happen. If this occurs, we apologize for the inconvenience.
- Last, but most importantly, PLEASE SLOW DOWN. In a snow storm, the posted speed is way too fast. If you have any questions, please contact us at 804-4451.

More on Snow Plowing the City Streets

Spanish Fork City's objective is to provide an adequate transportation system for vehicles properly equipped for winter driving conditions. Optimal conditions will be provided as soon as practicable after a storm. Certain streets have a higher intensity use and thus have a higher priority for snow removal. Spanish Fork City has established the following criteria for snow removal:

Priority 1: Primary streets, such as arterials and major collectors, that are determined to be the minimum network needed to provide the basic transportation system for public safety, schools, high volume streets, steep grades, etc. These streets will be plowed 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. From 6:00 am to 11:00pm only traffic lanes will be plowed.

Priority 2: Secondary and residential routes and selected minor collector, bus routes and residential streets deemed desirable to be maintained as weather permits. Traffic lanes only. Areas which are prone to wind and drifting snow will receive priority. Service will be provided during regular working hours.

Priority 3: Remaining city streets including cul-de-sacs. Traffic lanes only, Cul-de-sacs 1 pass in, 1 pass out providing no cars are parked in roadway. Service will be provided during regular working hours.

Please note: It is not the position of Spanish Fork City to maintain a bare pavement policy nor to provide snow and ice removal on every city street during or after every snow storm. Therefore, after periods in which movement of traffic has occurred, snow plows no longer become an option to totally clear snow packed or icy streets, except to remove loose material on top.
