residents and business owners. Our community enjoys a high quality of life and a low crime rate as a result of our philosophy of common sense and compassionate policing.



Victim Rights

Utah Constitution declares victims of crime have the following rights:

- To be treated with fairness and dignity and respect.
- To be informed of, be present at and to be heard at important criminal justice hearings.
- To have a sentencing judge, for the purpose of imposing an appropriate sentence, receive and consider, without evidentiary limitation, reliable information concerning the background, character, and conduct of a person convicted of an offense.

Funding

The Victims of Crime Act, passed in 1984 under President Ronald Reagan, created the Victims of Crime Act Fund, or VOCA Fund, to be a protected and dedicated source of funding for crime victim programs. The VOCA Fund does not depend on taxpayer dollars – it is derived from fines and penalties on offenders at the federal level. Spanish Fork City applied for VOCA funding, the Utah Office for Victims of Crime reviewed and approved the applications and awarded the following amounts to serve victims of crime in Spanish Fork City.

2021-2023 VOCA Grant \$89,210.92 (two year grant)



INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

The investigative division plays a crucial role in upholding the law and ensuring public safety. They utilize a variety of techniques, including surveillance, interviews, forensic analysis, and collaboration with other agencies, to gather evidence and solve cases. Their work is essential in bringing justice to victims and maintaining order within Spanish Fork City.



The investigations Division is responsible for general

Lt. Brandon Anderson investigations as well as numerous special investigative responsibilities. Some of the detective assignments are general investigator, city drug enforcement officer, Utah County Major Crimes Task Force, and school resource officers.

The Investigations division has the responsibility of investigating both criminal and non-criminal cases such as: arson, burglary, robbery, theft, forgery, fraud, identity theft, homicide, assault, kidnapping, sex, offenses, public health, and safety crimes such as weapons offenses, illegal drug use, drug trafficking and pornography violations. Some of the non-criminal cases are runaways and death investigations.

The Lieutenant directly supervises the sergeant and plays a crucial role in managing the investigative team, ensuring that investigations are conducted effectively and efficiently, and providing leadership and strategic direction to the division. His role is a blend of administrative duties, supervisory responsibilities and active participation in investigations.

The Sergeant directly supervises eight detectives in the investigative division. He plays a vital role in ensuring the smooth operation of the investigative team, offering both supervision and direct investigative expertise. He is pivotal in guiding the team through complex cases while also managing his own investigative responsibilities.

PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division is comprised of one Lieutenant, four Sergeants and 20 officers. The primary responsibility of the Patrol Division is to provide 24 hour a day police response. Officers respond to calls for service in both emergency and non-emergency situations.

Aside from responding to dispatched calls, officers are responsible for patrolling neighborhoods, enforcing traffic Lt. Cad laws, enforcing city and state codes and ordinances, investigating traffic accidents, providing traffic control, investigating cases, providing presentations to citizens of the community, and other duties as assigned.




DEPARTMENT STATISTICS

Calls for Service

A call for service is a request for assistance from someone in the community. There was a total of 25,130 calls for service in 2023. Most calls handled by the department are calls for service as opposed to calls reporting a crime. These may include someone calling for help in opening a locked car, a traffic accident, public presentation requests, etc. The majority of a patrol officer's time is spent on these types of calls.




How Calls for Service Were Received

Calls for Service Comparison







Crimes Against Persons Comparison








Arrest Comparison














Toast to Our Fallen Comrades





You may have noticed the small table set for one that is off on its own. It is reserved to honor our fallen brothers and sisters in arms. This symbolizes that they are with us here in spirit. We should never forget the brave men and women who answered our nations call to serve and served the cause of freedom in a special way.

We are ever mindful that the sweetness and enduring peace has always been tainted by the bitterness of personal sacrifice. We are compelled to never forget that while we enjoy our daily pleasures there are others who have endured the agonies of pain, deprivation and death.

I would like to explain the meaning of the items on the special table.

The table is small showing our everlasting concern for our fallen brothers and sisters.

The tablecloth is white symbolizing the purity of their motives when answering the call of duty.

The single rose displayed in a vase reminds us of the life of each of our fallen brothers and sisters and the loved ones and friends of these comrades who keep the faith.

The vase is tied with a red ribbon a symbol of our continued determination to remember our fallen comrades.

A slice of lemon on the bread plate reminds us of the bitter fate of those who will never return.

A pinch of salt symbolizes the tears endured by the families of those who have sacrificed all.

Scriptures represent the strength gained through faith to sustain those lost from our country.

The glass is inverted. They cannot toast with us at this time.

The chair is empty because they are no longer with us.

Let us remember and never forget their sacrifice. May they and their families ever be watched over and protected.



Definition of Awards:

The **Life Saving Medal** will be awarded to any department member for saving a human life. This award is intended for all members directly responsible for saving a human life. Documentation and supporting evidence must be included, such as statements from witnesses, physicians or supervisors. This award may also be made upon evidence that the member's actions prolonged a human life, permitting the victim to be treated by medical personnel, even though the victim may have died later.

The **Unit Citation** may be awarded to any sworn or civilian employee for exceptional work based upon one act or upon an extended series of exemplary service. This award does not rise to the level of the higher requirements of a Medal of Distinction but is greater than a Letter of Commendation.

A Citizen's Award of Appreciation will be presented to a citizen who provides outstanding assistance to the department in preventing crime; or providing a great service; or apprehending criminals; or renders an outstanding heroic act at considerable personal danger to him/herself, which culminated in saving a life.

He/She is familiar with statutory requirements and offense elements of the Criminal Code, Code of Criminal Procedure, Juvenile Court Act, and Vehicle Code. Further, the officer is familiar and complies with department policies, procedures, rules and regulations and performs his/her duty without close supervision.
- 2. Organizational Philosophy: Consistently adheres to and practices the Mission Statement of the Spanish Fork Police Department.
- 3. Demeanor: Is favorably distinguished from his or her peers in the manner in which he or she interacts with others; and whose conduct reflects favorably on himself or herself, this department, and the City of Spanish Fork.
- 4. Self-Improvement Efforts: Strives continually to be better informed, seeks self-improvement opportunities, encourages others, and takes advantage of every opportunity to improve his or her ability to be more professionally competent.
- 5. Personnel File: The Chief of Police will provide the Selection Committee any letters of recognition/awards. No officer will be eligible for this award if a letter of reprimand (or greater form of discipline) was received during this selection year.

The Officer of the Year award was given to Officer Chris Olson. Officer Olson joined the department in 2017 fresh out of the Police Academy. He serves on the Peer Support Team and well as being a Detective. He was nominated for this award by Sgt. Clay Hooley.

The following is an excerpt from his nomination form: For the past year, I have had the opportunity to supervise Detective Olson in investigations and have personally witnessed the effort he

has put forth in serving our community. Working investigations comes with a new set of burdens that are often daunting tasks. As Detective Olson has been faced with these challenges, he has done so with a positive attitude and willingness to see cases through to the end.

I would like to highlight a case that was assigned to Detective Olson earlier in the year. This case was a double homicide case. Regardless of circumstances surrounding a homicide case, they are never easy. This case required Detective Olson to travel beyond the borders of our state, required countless affidavits to be submitted in hopes of obtaining warrants, involved working with the Federal Bureau of Investigations to analyze data, and he worked with the governor's office to bring the arrested suspect back to Utah. There was never a time during this case that Detective Olson faltered.

But it is not only the big cases such as the one referenced above that makes Detective Olson a commendable police officer. Even with cases that may seem insignificant, Detective Olson has taken the same approach, with willingness and sense of duty to see that our community members are properly served in this area of policing. Another case that I can recall involved a multi hundred-thousand dollar business embezzlement case. This was a case where multiple victims were seeking justice for many years in regard to a local businessman who had defrauded many out of their hard earned money. Detective Olson went above and beyond in this case, learning new techniques and collaborating with other departments to ensure this suspect was brought to justice.

Outside of Detective Olson's thorough case work, he has dedicated himself to learning cutting edge techniques and technology to help strengthen our investigations unit. He has become well known in drafting and implementing warrants to obtain evidence. He understands how to treat those who have suffered unimaginable crimes as victims and has the ability to build trust with these people. He will help them to the best of his abilities.

MAJOR CASES

Double Homicide

On March 15th officers responded to a local residence for a welfare check. It was reported that a married couple had missed several days of work and would not respond to phone calls. Upon checking the residence, officers found the couple inside the home deceased. The circumstances around the discovery of the dead

bodies, suggested the case was a homicide. Detectives were called to the scene and a full-fledged homicide investigation was initiated. A suspect, the couple's troubled adult son, was identified as a suspect. Efforts were made to locate the suspect. The suspect was located in a neighboring state in what appeared to be an attempt to get away from Utah. The suspect was taken into



custody and later brought back to Utah. The suspect was ultimately arrested based off of physical and forensic evidence discovered on the scene. The suspect has been charged with a double-homicide and his trial is pending in the court.



House Fire

On March 28th first responders responded to a house fire at a local residence. The



owner and sole
occupant of the
residence was an older
female. At the time the
fire was called in, there
was no sign of the
homeowner. The fire
brought total
devastation to the home
and the home ended up
collapsing, leaving a
large pile of debris.
Officers worked with the
missing female's family

to try and find her. At first, it appeared that the female was likely not home at the time of the fire however after gathering further information officers could not confirm whether or not the female was in the house debris as a result of the fire or

not. Officers spent several days sifting through the house debris. On the second day of sifting, was when the Spanish Fork High School swatting call came out, to which all officers on this scene responded to the swatting call. Once the high school incident was over, detectives returned to the house



fire detail the same day and continued sifting. As the evening approached, the missing homeowner's body was found buried in the debris.



Swatting

On March 29th officers were called to Spanish Fork High School for an active shooter. It was reported that a student had shot multiple students in a bathroom in the school. Officers quickly arrived on scene and initiated an active shooter response and protocol. The school



was cleared with no signs of the shooter. The response from first responders was



overwhelming. Officers later learned that the call was a swatting call and the incident was a hoax. The incident funneled through the media. The police response was highlighted as being swift and courageous. Regarding the caller in this case, it was determined that the call was

made from overseas and the information surrounding the call was submitted to the

FBI. As a result of this swatting call, police, fire, EMS, the school, and the city in general was able to implement training and carried the call out as if it was real.





Department Accreditation

The Spanish Fork Police Department is an accredited agency through the Utah Chief's Accreditation Alliance and the Utah Chief's of Police Association. This accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping law enforcement agencies calculate and improve their overall performances. The Spanish Fork Police Department was first accredited in November of 2018. The accreditation cycle is five years with yearly self-evaluations to determine continued accreditation compliance. The Spanish Fork Police Department just completed its five-year accreditation and was re-assessed for another five-year cycle. The department went through an assessment by outside trained assessors who verified that applicable standards have been in compliance with new and updated accreditation standards. This accreditation shows that the department is following best-practice policies and procedures for law enforcement. Accreditation status represents a significant professional achievement. Accreditation acknowledges the implementation of policies and procedures that are conceptually sound and operationally effective.





EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

2023 was a great year for our Emergency Management program. Our plans, processes and efforts were challenged as we faced a number of real-life events. On the very same day, our Community Emergency Response Team was deployed to help search the ruble of a house fire to search for a missing person. Shortly into that project, our public safety departments were alerted of an active shooter at Spanish Fork High School. Fortunately, it turned out to be a state-wide hoax. Nevertheless, we learned of our response capabilities and it was amazing to see, along with a few improvements to be made. Finally, that evening we held a public meeting to prepare for the spring runoff, after a record year of snow. We have learned a lot through this year, and our plans moving forward have gotten even better. Our Spring run-off was a long process to plan, prepare for, respond to, and recover from. It was amazing to see city crews, community members and partners throughout the state come together to mitigate the flooding the best we could. Spanish Fork

experienced great success and was recognized across the County and State. Real-life events cannot postpone our training and exercises, as we continue doing each year. We held an active shooter full-scale exercise with our hospital, and many tabletop exercises with our city departments. Mitigation projects and public outreach and education programs are always a priority for us. We will continue into next year building our capabilities and partnerships, to increase our resiliency and to continue with the motto, "Home of Pride and Progress."
