History of Spanish Fork City

The recorded history of Spanish Fork began on September 23, 1776. Two Franciscan friars, Father Francisco Atanasio de Dominquez, and Father Sylvestre Velez de Escalante were in the area mapping a route from Santa Fe, New Mexico, to Monterey, California. The city was not settled until frontier pioneers arrived in 1850. After the January 19, 1855, city charter, immigrants from Iceland colonized in Spanish Fork. The community is now home to over 30,000 residents who enjoy the amenities provided by the natural landscape.

Public Safety Department

The citizens of Spanish Fork are reminded to call 911 in all emergencies.

Spanish Fork City is privileged to have an established police department with knowledgeable and capable employees. These officers are involved in detective work, education of students, and responding to citizen concerns.

Volunteers of the fire department spend many hours in training, and receive only the highest quality instruction. Ambulance department volunteers have the most extensive ambulatory services of any volunteer association in Utah County. A well designed emergency response program also serves the community.

Utility Departments

The city has extensive utility services for citizens including a culinary water system, a sewer treatment plant, an electric transmission and distribution system, Pressurized Irrigation System, and Spanish Fork Community Network Cable & Internet. Each system is maintained and updated as needed. The city constantly takes steps to ensure needed services in the future will be available and will function properly.

Parks and Recreation

The city has a comprehensive parks & recreation department consisting of twelve divisions to serve the citizens leisure needs; recreation & sports programs, parks, golf course, water park, special events, arts council, fairgrounds, gun club, senior center, buildings & grounds and cemetery. You can get information and be connected to any of these divisions by calling 801-804-4600. You also call that same number for Pavilion Reservations, Fairgrounds Scheduling and all your recreation program questions.

Our beautifully manicured parks are equipped with pavilions, playgrounds and plenty of open space for the whole family to enjoy. Our sports complexes are considered some of the best in the state and are the home to many youth as well as adult baseball, softball, soccer and football teams. We also have an outstanding outdoor water park complete with toddler wading pool, water slide, splash pad and diving area. If you like your water a little colder then you can visit our reservoir and enjoy the nice sandy beach. You can take your canoe, raft, float tube or fishing gear and have a good time in the sun. If horses, rodeo or shooting is your thing then you will love our great fairgrounds facilities and our world class trap shooting gun club. If you would rather participate in music, theater or art then our arts council provides a community theater and youth theater program as well as a youth arts festival, adult cultural arts classes, regional chorale and a philharmonic orchestra. If parades, carnivals, kites and fairs interest you then our special events will appeal to your sense of summer fun. Fiesta Days is the big city celebration and we also host the Utah County Fair. When you reach the "golden years" we have just the place for you. Our senior center is a happening place equipped with fabulous cooks, activities, tours and great associations. The cemetery is truly an outstanding city historical site. It's mature trees, uniform streets and variety of old headstones make it an enjoyable place to visit. 
