

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South Utah County Community Oriented Policing (COP) Meeting

South Utah County COP Meetings are held monthly at the Spanish Fork Police Department. At these meetings, representatives from community service providers along with representatives from law enforcement join together to collaborate & discuss ways to work together to provide services to community members who are victims of crime, who experience mental health issues, homelessness and those who are in need. Currently representatives from Wasatch Mental Health, Utah Valley Regional Medical Center, Mountain View Hospital, Provo Behavioral Hospital, Adult Protective Services, Division of Child & Family Services, Food & Care Coalition, Tabitha's Way, Adult Probation & Parole, along with Spanish Fork, Santaquin, Payson, Salem, Springville and Mapleton Police Departments and Utah County Sheriff Office attend these meetings.

Funding

The Victims of Crime Act, passed in 1984 under President Ronald Reagan, created the Victims of Crime Act Fund, or VOCA Fund, to be a protected and dedicated source of funding for crime victim programs. The VOCA Fund does not depend on taxpayer dollars – it is derived from fines and penalties on offenders at the federal level. Spanish Fork City applied for VOCA funding, the Utah Office for Victims of Crime reviewed and approved the applications and awarded the following amounts to serve victims of crime in Spanish Fork City.

> 2017-2019 VOCA Grant 2019-2021 VOCA Grant 2021-2023VOCA Grant

\$103,661.61 (two year grant) \$126,116.62 (two year grant) & 89,210.92 (two year grant) *

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*Federal funding decreased greatly in the 2021-2023 grant cycle. Agencies throughout the State were required to reduce funding requests significantly.





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INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

The Investigative Division has the responsibility of conducting proactive investigations as well as investigations on criminal and non-criminal cases such as: arson, burglary, robbery, theft, forgery, fraud, identity theft, homicide, assault, kidnapping, sex offenses, public health and safety crimes such as weapons offenses, alcohol, tobacco, illegal drug use, drug trafficking and pornography violations. Some of the non-criminal cases are runaways and death investigations.

The Investigations Division is responsible for general investigations as well as numerous special investigative responsibilities. Some of the detective assignments are general investigator, drug enforcement officer, Utah County Major Crimes Task Force and school resource officers.

The Lieutenant directly supervises the Sergeant. He is responsible for reviewing cases and assigning the cases to the detectives for follow up investigations and monitoring their performance and quality of work. He also assists in investigations and major investigations as needed.

The Sergeant directly supervises eight detectives. He also carries a caseload of active investigations and follows up on these investigations. He closely monitors the investigations conducted by the detectives under him and provides assistance and suggestions as needed.

The Patrol Division is comprised of one Lieutenant, four Sergeants and 19 officers. The primary responsibility of the Patrol Division is to provide 24 hour a day police response. Officers respond to calls for service in both emergency and non-emergency situations.

Aside from responding to dispatched calls, officers are




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DEPARTMENT STATISTICS

Calls for Service

A call for service is a request for assistance from someone in the community. Most calls handled by the department are calls for service as opposed to calls reporting a crime. These may include someone calling for help in opening a locked car, a traffic accident, public presentation requests, etc. The majority of a patrol officer's time is spent on these types of calls. There were a total of 23,321 calls for service in 2021.



Event Clock






Burglary Reports by Type of Burglary






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Traffic Accidents








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DEPARTMENT HISTORY

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Award



Detective Brandon Johnson attended the Utah Narcotic Officers Association annual conference. While there he was presented the award for the 2021 Narcotic Officer of the Year. Detective Johnson has been instrumental in taking large amounts of drugs off the streets while serving in this position. Congratulations Detective Johnson on a well-deserved award.

This is an excerpt from his nomination form:

"Brandon has a huge heart. He is very service oriented and has never turned anyone down who has needed his help. Like many others in this profession, Brandon does not do this job for the money but for the satisfaction of making a difference. Several of Brandon's confidential informants that previously viewed law enforcement in a negative way have thanked him for helping them change their lives and their outlook on law enforcement. Brandon's legacy will live on forever as he has focused on sharing his knowledge and experience by training newer members of the task force and giving them the tools needed to be successful."





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Missing Person Case Solved

In 1988 Peggy Sue Case was reported missing from Spanish Fork. Lt. Carl Johnston worked that case for many years. Since the time of Peggy's disappearance, Carl has had that case file on his desk and on his mind until the day he retired.

In May of 2017 a Spanish Fork resident reported that something was amiss in his yard. He lives in the home that Peggy and her boyfriend, Michael Kufrin, lived in at the time of her disappearance. Officers responded to this residence and searched a small root cellar on the property. They observed bones wrapped in blankets in the shed. They immediately called out Spanish Fork Detectives and the Utah County Crime



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Scene Team for them to process the scene. Human remains were found in the shed. These remains were sent to the Utah State Crime Lab for processing. The results of their testing showed the remains were that of Peggy Case.

With this new information many more man hours were spent investigating the case. A warrant was issued for Michael Kufrin and he was extradited back to Utah.

A trial was held in July of 2021 and Michael Kufrin was found guilty in the homicide of Peggy.











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Fire Calls by District

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Ambulance Department Overview

The Spanish Fork Ambulance responded to 2,785 calls this year. They are staffed with dedicated employees who provide professional around the clock emergency medical services to our growing community. EMTs are now staffed at Station 62

located on Canyon Road 24 hours a day. EMTs are staffed at Station 61 located on Main Street from 7:00 am to 10:00 pm each day. The average response time from call to scene is about seven minutes.

We look forward to continuing to serve our citizens with professionalism and compassion in the future.








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Organization Chart











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Ambulance Call Comparison



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EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

This year's emergency preparedness efforts have been primarily focused on helping each city department plan and prepare for disasters that they could face on a regular basis. Through these efforts, each department becomes more prepared to plan for, respond to, and recover from disasters. Each department will better understand their role in disaster response, hazard mitigation efforts, prioritizing their duties, and restoring community lifelines. Another main focus this year has been community outreach. Through working with the Chamber of Commerce, we are offering business and community preparedness and resiliency courses, the CERT program, and other educational opportunities, such as preparing your family and neighborhood for disasters. This is an ongoing effort, and we have seen tremendous growth over the last few years.
